### Emergency Contact Info

Have you changed your address, telephone, cell phone, or other important contact info since you last turned in a chapter “Emergency Contact Form?” Since it is early in the season it would be a good time to update any information on your personal contacts in case we would have to get a hold of someone when we were on the road.

Consider updating your form (if needed) and send it to Bob. (A form is enclosed)

A database of important member information is maintained and carried by the officers so in the event of an emergency on the road we have some info that may help you and your family.

**Do you have ICE in your cell phone?** ICE is an acronym for “*In Case of Emergency*” and programming your cell phone with ICE entries that include names and numbers of your primary contacts may help in an emergency.

Then, “*In Case of Emergency*” if you are unable to respond, your cell phone will be a tool for emergency personnel to contact those people whom you have identified in your “ICE” entries.

Take some time to practice both your physical and mental preparation to ensure that you—and your ride is ready for the spring! Below are excerpts (bullets) from an article that appeared in Motorcycle Cruiser's magazine and republished on their web page for distribution.

Street Survival—50 Ways to  
SAVE YOUR Life

- ASSUME YOU'RE INVISIBLE.
- BEWARE OF CARS RUNNING TRAFFIC LIGHTS.
- BE CONSIDERATE.
- CHECK YOUR MIRRORS.
- DRESS FOR THE CRASH.
- MIND THE GAP. (2 second following distance, scan 12 seconds ahead).
- HOPE FOR THE BEST, PREPARE FOR THE WORST
- BEWARE OF TUNER CARS (with their radios blasting and taking all their attention!)
- LEAVE YOUR EGO AT HOME
- EXCESSIVE ENTRANCE SPEED HURTS. It's the leading cause of single-bike accidents on twisty roads -- use it on the way out of a corner, not in.
- PAY ATTENTION
- DON'T TRUST THAT DEER WHISTLE
- MIRRORS ONLY SHOW YOU PART OF THE PICTURE
- LEARN TO USE BOTH BRAKES
- BE PATIENT. It's what you don't see that gets you. The extra look could save your butt.
- KEEP THE FRONT BRAKE COVERED--ALWAYS
- WATCH YOUR CLOSING SPEED
- LOOK WHERE YOU WANT TO GO
- BEWARE THE VERGE AND THE MERGE. A lot of nasty surprises end up on the sides of the road.
- KEEP YOUR EYES MOVING
- LEFT-TURNING CARS REMAIN THE LEADING KILLER OF MOTORCYCLISTS
- COME TO A FULL STOP AT THE NEXT STOP SIGN
- THINK BEFORE YOU ACT. Careful whipping around that Car going 7 MPH in a 25 MPH zone or you could end up with your head in the drivers side when he turns in front of you.

**W**e all know how important it is to develop the  
habit of performing a systematic check of our  
motorcycle. The T-Clock check or other approach to carefully  
looking over our ride helps to improve our safety on the road  
by identifying any problems that may be found with our bike.

Many of us tow trailers behind our bikes to assist us with  
“alternative loading” as we travel about the countryside. How  
much time do we spend surveying the condition of this piece  
of equipment? It is as important to our ride safety to have a  
properly maintained trailer as well as our motorcycle. Here are  
a few points to review as you inspect your trailer before its  
next use:

- Lights — Brake lights, turn signals, running lights
- Wiring — Cracks, pinches, breaks, chafing, clean connections
- Tires — Tread, cracks, correct pressure (don't forget the spare if you carry one)
- Wheels — Rust, lug nuts (on and tight), wheel bearings
- Hitch — Locking shoe adjustment, pin or ball clamp, bolts and frame connections, rust, loose connections
- Ball or Pin — Unusual wear, cleanliness, lubrication
- Safety Chains — Adequate length, strength, rust, attachment hooks
- Suspension — Correct pressure in air shocks, rust, loose mountings, spring tension
- Chassis & Frame — Rust, cracks, broken frame members, cracked welds
- Tongue — Rust, cracks, trailer frame bolts

Bikers Understand Exactly Why  
Dogs Stick Their Heads Out Of Car Windows

Who knew that our parents were so smart about motorcycling?  
...from your friends at the AMA office

The older we get, the smarter we realize our mom's were. That little bundle of wisdom taught us an awful lot about life – mostly against our own will. What we reluctantly come to know is that once we became adults (and parents), we realize not only how smart Mom was, but also that we probably sound an awful lot like her.

Admonitions like "don't point" and "look both ways" and "put that away when you're done with it" may be ignored by the next generation (as we ignored it originally), but these timeless pearls of wisdom actually make sense when applied as *Mom's lessons to motorcycling*.

Don't Point. Yes, it is impolite in society, but on the road it can be deadly. A careful rider always stops with the front wheel pointing slightly to one side of the car in front, lest he or she become the meat in a car sandwich if someone misses the light change and doesn't stop. Leaving enough distance between you and the rear of the vehicle ahead, with your tire aimed at an escape route, lets you get away as soon as you hear the squeal of tires or see a fast-approaching car in your mirrors.

Look Both Ways. Always good advice before crossing the street, but it's a good idea to take to the next level on your motorcycle. Look all ways: 360-degree awareness.

Sharing. Always encouraged, but never the rule. Mom was always OK with sharing my Evil Kneivel stunt set, but never my gum. The lesson learned is that sharing is not always a great idea. One example? How about sharing your lane with a riding buddy on the open road? You pay taxes, command your space! There are lots of good reasons you might want to have the whole lane to yourself.

Dress for the Accident. This is the "clean undies" rule. Mom was always concerned with the condition of underwear, "In case you have an accident." It turns out this rule applies to more than underwear.

Clean Up. These were never two words wanted to be heard as a kid, but they provided a valuable motorcycling lesson nonetheless. Put some soapy water to your ride every once in a while. Cleaning your ride will keep you on top of what is going on with your bike by doing a periodic hands-on, grunge-off inspection.

Put Away Your Toys. When you have something you value, don't you want to take good care of it? It only takes a second to put up your motorcycle and your gear properly, and it will make your Mom happy to see how much you've grown up.

Of course, dad wasn't a slouch when it came to advice, either. He was fond of saying, "Garbage in, garbage out" whenever a half-hearted stab at sports or a school effort was shown. That was training to be careful about choosing the kinds of parts and lubricants used on my bike. If you know you are using a substandard item, expect substandard performance.

It's a common-sense warning to take it easy for the first few miles of a ride, and for good reason. It takes a while for your mind, body, and tire temperatures to come up to speed.

But it's worth being mindful of the dangers of the final few miles, too. That's when you are tired, mentally dull, and the familiar surroundings close to home can lull you into a false sense of security.

Work to keep your mind in the game until after your kickstand is down in the garage.

### **Mother's Day Ride for our Daughters**

Not headed to Cape Cod with us? If you are looking for an alternative ride that weekend, consider the "**Mother's Day Ride for our Daughters**" based out of West Dover, Vermont. This ride (and weekend events) are to raise money and awareness for breast cancer and ovarian cancer research.






