Our club grows every year. The newsletter went out to 2,002 U.S. members, 405 Canadian members, and about Rhode Island-1 is the host chapter for our next Annual

Red Knights Convention for 2002 (August 22-25, 2002).

Rooms are blocked at the Sheraton Providence Airport Hotel in Warwick, Rhode Island (401- 738-4000) and more rooms at the Comfort Inn Hotel (401-732-0470), just a stone's throw away from the convention hotel if overflow space is needed. Ask for the "Red Knights Motorcycle Club" rate at both hotels.

The Red Knights have what they call the "Run of the House" from August 22 - 24, 2001 at the Sheraton. We have reserved 70 rooms for Thursday (8/22) and 130 rooms for Friday and Saturday (8/23-24). The price for the rooms will be \$119.00 a night. (Just a side note that this hotel's group rates for this time of year are usually \$125 to \$159 a night).

The registration fee for this year's convention is \$80.00 per-person. With your registration fee you get the following amenities;

- "Goodie Bag" and Program Journal,
- 2002 Convention Pin,
- Hospitality Room, (which will be open except during any scheduled meeting),

Saturday Night Functions include Dinner (with choices of Roasted Chicken, London Broil Steak, or Boston Baked Scrod) and the awards ceremony with dancing afterwards!

A Sunday morning farewell executive breakfast buffet rounds out the convention.

Rhode Island-1 is also going to have a "REAL" New England style clam bake on Thursday. Price for this is \$25.00 per-person. This includes your choice of Lobster, Steak or Chicken with Red Clam Chowder and Clam Cakes, Steamed Clams, Steamed Mussels, and more!


There will also be a bike show on Saturday.

DON'T Follow that Bus!

You're on a familiar route in urban traffic. One that you have frequently ridden. You eventually get behind a bus or other large vehicle. With this sized vehicle in front of you, your the road ahead is limited.

Approaching a major intersection, you decide to stay behind the larger vehicle rather than attempt a lane change. Before the larger vehicle clears the intersection, you are surprised by a car making a left-hand turn immediately behind the larger vehicle. You swerve towards the right and narrowly avoid getting hit by the left turner, and swerve back into the lane. But it was a close call that could have been deadly!

Never follow immediately behind busses, trucks, or other large vehicles where you are hidden fron the view of oncoming drivers. Rather than follow immediately behind a large vehicle, you should change lanes or at least drop back to open up the view (for both the on-coming traffic and for you).



Another great meal at Mother Anna's was just one highlight on our adventure in Boston back in March.

What do the Big Dig, Old Ironsides, Bob's socks, and Linda's head all have in common? The answer is we got to spend time looking at each one when we were in the city! (Details to follow).

Our first stop was the bridge that headed over to Charlestown. We stopped at a small memorial that is on the bridge.

We stopped at the Charlestown Navy Yard and visited the U.S.S. Constitution and its museum. Being a national monument, you have to undergo a search and walk through a metal detector before you can board the ship. Everyone went through fine except for your vice-president. I emptied all my pockets, had to take off my coat, and even had to take off my boots before they would let me through! I was starting to wonder if I was going to be the next Hanes underwear commercial — Thank goodness that Steve's camera was being checked over at the time! (When I got dressed that morning, I noticed a hole in my sock and thought 'no one will see that,' guess I was wrong.)

The walk on the ship was well worth the hassle, though.

When we were leaving the grounds and headed for the North-end for Mother Anna's, Linda was being social and didn't see the light pole in her travel lane — BONK! So we had to take a few minutes as Cliff and Steve evaluated her mental condition. (Some ice and a cold drink at the restaurant helped alleviate any suffering once we got to Mother Anna's.)

The meal and the hospitality at Mother Anna's was as wonderful as always. What great food! After dinner, the Mickle's had to catch an early train for a prior commitment, so they headed home as the rest of us were off to Quincy Market for some pastries and ice cream.

We arrived back at North Station about 30 minutes early. The station was busy and all the seats were filled so Bob L. plopped down against the wall. He took off his knit cap and said to Linda, 'hey lady, you got any spare change?' Linda threw some change in his hat, and the woman behind her came up to offer Bob her hot chocolate (thinking he was a homeless person looking for some help). Do you ride with **S.I.P.D.E.** in mind?

S.I.P.D.E. is an acronym that the Motorcycle Safety Foundation (and drivers' ed classes around the country) teach to constantly remind us to look for and prepare for what is in our riding environment.

- S- is for Scan. As we ride we should be constantly scanning; ahead of us, in our peripheral vision, and behind us in our mirrors.
- I— is for **Identify**. As we scan we are looking for potential conflicts with our ride safety. We need to identify those potential problems.
- P— is for **Predict**. Once we identify potential problems we should also be able to predict what those "obstacles for a safe ride" might do to us.
- D– is for **Decide**. We have trained as motorcyclists through formal training and ride experience, and we should be able to decide what actions on our part can lower our risk in association with the problem we have identified.
- E— is for **Execute**. We have made a decision on how best to deal with the hazard or problem we have recognized. Now it is time to put that plan into action.

Let's put SIPDE into action on our ride. We are cruising down a residential street and see several children playing ball in the front yard of a home. (**SCAN and IDENTIFY**).

We realize that they could pose a hazard to us as we ride (and to themselves) if their ball comes into the street. (**PREDICT**).

We want to remove ourselves from them as much as possible. We look at our lane position. Maybe in changing lane position we can distance ourselves from them. We can also cover the brake and reduce our speed. These actions help reduce our reaction time and our braking distance. (**DECIDE and EXECUTE**).

We have scanned and identified a potential problem. We made a conscious decision as what could happen and how best to handle that situation if it occurs. Now if the ball or the children come into the road we are prepared to make a safe reaction to answer that change in our environment.

Think about **S.I.P.D.E.** whenever you are on the road — on two (or three) wheels or in your four-wheeler. It is a good mental habit to improve your skills as a rider and help keep your time on the road a safe one.

It is time to stop and think — What would we do, how could we get the information we may need in an emergency while we were together on our bikes? When we are out on our bikes we tend to not think about those things, but what would happen if we had an accident and had to get in touch with one of our (or your) family members in a emergency. Would you have that information at your finger tips? I think not!! With that in mind there is a form included in this newsletter for all our members to fill out. The chapter will make up at least two emergency books available to carry on all our rides. That form should have all the info for any type of emergency; Who to call, Doctors numbers, Insurance numbers, Family or Friends telephone or pager numbers, and who to contact in the chapter if we needed to get a tow or just some help. LETS PROTECT AND HELP OUT OUR RKMC FAMILY WITH THIS, so we will be ready for any type of problem. Sincerely, Ed B

Take a look at these two groups of circles. Specifically, look at the center circle in each group.

Which one is bigger?

Actually, they are both the same size. Our visual perception is what is different. Because the bottom circle is surrounded by larger objects, it appears smaller to us when our brain interprets what we see.

What does this have to do with being on a bike? Think about that circle in the bottom group as you on your bike, surrounded by cars and trucks. As each of those other drivers look at you, their brain is interpreting what it sees.

What they see — or don't see — could be the wrong size, the wrong speed, or their visual interpretation may miss you completely. We must use our brain to protect ourselves. What we wear (for colors), the lighting on our bike, our lane position, and our defensive driving skills all contribute to making ourselves seen and protected.

Road Gorp


A little rainwater on the road turns the surface into a slippery mess!

City Streets are extremely slippery during the first few minutes of a fresh rain, as the accumulated "road gorp" emulsifies with water. It takes about a half hour of steady downpour to completely was the accumulated oil off the pavement.

When it begins to rain and we are on the bikes, we some times get the urge to drive a little faster to hurry out of the rain.

Increasing your spend also demands more traction at a time when traction is poor.

Rather than try to hurry to your destination, as it begins to rain, the safer tactic is to stop for a leisurely lunch or cup of coffee and allow time for the rain to wash the road surface.



Have you ever considered joining the Massachusetts Motorcycle Association (MMA)?

The MMA are a politically active group of motorcyclists in the state and have recently worked on such issues as Nelly's Bill for better driver education, driver awareness campaigns, and veteran's and HP license plates for motorcyclists. They have also been strongly involved with some educational efforts in regards to specific communities that have police officers that target bikes for violations. I personally don't agree with their position on every issue; but I support their lobbying efforts as a united front of people who enjoy motorcycling.


Our group of friends in the Red Knights is so very special to us that we cannot even begin to express it. But having broken down on the way to Americade we need to try to put our thanks into words.

New Hampshire weighs safety course for bikers

New Hampshire bikers may not be getting a free ride much longer (in the *Live Free or Die* State). The director of the state Department of Motor Vehicles, Virginia Beecher, said the agency is considering a requirement that motorcyclists take a safety course to receive or retain their licenses.

Bikers are required to take the classes in 38 other states.

Beecher said that before the state goes in that direction, it wants to make sure it can offer enough classes to accommodate its 65,000 licensed riders.

Rider education is an important aspect of everyone's skills. It is not a mandatory requirement in Massachusetts, but the Red Knights do support Rider Education efforts, and encourage everyone to take an experienced rider course.


