



That car in the left turning lane and other vehicles at the light will trigger the light to change.



AS WE ALL KNOW (or should!), intersections are the leading spots for crashes involving motorcycles and other vehicles. Fortunately, traffic at busier intersections tends to be managed by automated traffic signals. The presence of those signals should be enough to eliminate incidents. In reality, they do not. Why? Because drivers (and some riders) tend to push limits at the critical transition time when lights change. Drivers anticipate green lights, anxiously jumping into the intersection prematurely. Simultaneously, impatient drivers accelerate through red lights to avoid sitting through another cycle. That makes the transitioning traffic light a truly dangerous proposition for any motorcyclist.

Riders commonly carry speed up to an intersection, especially if the traffic light ahead shines green. But if that light has been green the entire time it's been in view, one can't know how long it has been green. More important, we can't know if it is about to change. As riders, a good rule of thumb (or throttle hand) is to assume that if the light has been green the whole time it's been in view, we should consider it to be a "stale" green that is old enough to turn yellow by the time we arrive. On our approach we should then check the mirrors (looking for that driver behind who might be determined to make it through the intersection with or without us), and select a speed that would allow us to calmly, smoothly and safely stop before the light potentially turns to red. Look for vehicles waiting at the light to the right or left, as well as in an opposing leftturn lane; they will surely trigger a stale green to change to red even sooner. Anticipating the stale green gives us fresh options to stay in control at intersections.

WHAT VIRGINIA TECH LEARNED ABOUT HOW AND WHY WE CRASH OUR MOTORCYCLES

What do you learn if you pick 100 riders, put five video cameras and data-logging equipment on their motorcycles and record them for a total of 366,667 miles?

Several things, some of which we knew, some surprising. Intersections are dangerous. We either need to pay better attention or work on our braking techniques, because we crash into the back of other vehicles way too often. We're not good enough at cornering, especially right turns. And we drop our bikes a lot (probably more often than any of us imagined or were willing to admit).

The study was done for the Motorcycle Safety Foundation by the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute (VTTI). Of course there's a lot more to it than those findings above.

Virginia Tech studied motorcycle crashes by recruiting 100 riders from age 21 to 79 in California, Arizona, Florida and Virginia. They outfitted their motorcycles with video cameras showing the rider's face and forward, rear, left and right views. GPS and data loggers captured other information, such as brake pressure, acceleration, etc.

Where do we crash? Intersections. An uncontrolled intersection presents nearly 41 times the risk of no intersection. A parking lot or driveway intersection is more than eight times as risky and an intersection with a signal is almost three times as risky.

A downhill grade increased the risk by a factor of four while an uphill grade doubled it. Riders were nine times as likely to crash or have a near-crash incident on gravel or dirt roads than on paved roads. And riders were twice as likely to have an incident in a right-hand turn than on a straight section of road.

How do we crash? We complain all the time about other people on the road trying to kill us, especially cars pulling into our paths. The VTTI study partially backs that up. Of the 99 crashes and near-crashes involving another vehicle, the three categories of other vehicles crossing the rider's path add up to 19. Here's the surprise, however. What's the most common scenario? Riders hitting (or nearly hitting) another vehicle from behind. There were 35 of those incidents. We are almost twice as likely to plow into a stopped car in front of us as to have someone pull into our path.

Researchers tried to break down rider behavior in crashes and near-crash incidents into two categories: aggressive riding or rider inattention or lack of skills. The cameras and other data helped determine, for example, if the rider ran the red light because of inattention or aggressive riding. The study found that aggressive riding increased risk by a factor of 18 while inattention or lack of skill increased it by a factor of nine.

It also seems we drop our bikes a lot. More than half the crashes were incidents some riders wouldn't define as a crash. Rider inattention or poor execution are to blame. The study finds "These low-speed 'crashes' appear to be relatively typical among everyday riding." These are incidents that would never be included in a different kind of study of motorcycle crashes. The cameras, however, capture it all, even our mundane but embarrassing moments.

What we can learn? Here's one thing I know I personally need to work on constantly, we need to look further ahead. We're just not paying close enough attention. We're not keeping our eyes up and looking far down the road, to see the developing situation that is going to cause the driver in front of us to slam on his brakes, or to spot the hunk of exploded truck tire lying in our lane. Those things are taking us by surprise and we're not giving ourselves enough time to react.

If you're looking at what's right in front of you on the track (or street), you're looking at the past, not the future. It's already too late for you to do anything about what's 20 feet ahead of your front tire.

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

NO BAD DAYS By Arden Kysely, Rider Magazine

IN MY WAY OF THINKING, touring should offer up three kinds of days: good, better and stellar. Outside of a serious injury, there are few things that will make a day of riding less than good for me. Even when hamstrung by an electrical failure miles from anywhere in foul weather, I've been able to find something redeeming about the day. Not every moment will be enjoyable, like finding that my stator was going south, but how you deal with a problem can make or break a day on the road. In the case of my stator, the support of my long-time touring buddies and my own perseverance (stupidity?) riding through a nasty hailstorm to a safe haven rescued the day for me. In spite of the inconvenience and weather, our mood remained upbeat that afternoon and we rallied to save the trip with some creative thinking. Everyone expects their touring days to be stellar, so having trouble on the road is always disappointing. I've found that making lemons into lemonade, even if it's a bit tart, can go a long way to saving a riding day from the ashes. I concentrate on getting back in the saddle-digging into the problem at hand is a productive distraction from wringing your hands. This could mean making phone calls, flagging down help or opening up the bike to investigate. The latter is what we did with mine, after a pie-and coffee consult in a warm café

Being prepared for interruptions helps me stay confident and

defense against being stranded; I think of it as the sweetener for my lemonade. Don't worry if you're not mechanical, the Good Samaritan who stops to help might be. The jumper cables my buddy Jim had with him (and which I now carry) were critical to getting my bike running when the battery ran low from the stator failure. And his multimeter helped diagnose the problem. Learn to fix a flat and carry the necessities to do so, and bring your owner's manual along. Before you leave, do some research on typical problems and write up a cheat sheet of solutions, including some helpful phone numbers. At a minimum, know where your fuse box is and carry spares. It's also important to know yourself and how you handle situations. For example, I become dumb and lazy when tired. Who else would ride 30 miles of dirt across a high, cold plateau in

the dark because they couldn't bother to unload the bike and check a fuse? That was a sour experience, but it has helped me in the long run. Knowing that I get stupid and stubborn when I'm beat makes me concentrate more and put in the effort to find a fix. There's nothing sweeter than conquering a problem and moving on to make a good day better...or even stellar. I wait too long for a tour to let anything spoil it.
