Elsewhere in this newsletter you will be able to review the miles that our members put on their bikes... and in 2025 we continue to chart more miles and memories together!

Overall last year we averaged 16.57 people per event for our 31 official events (an increase over 2023). Some events with larger attendance included our Blessing of the Bikes with 29 members on hand, the Spring State Meeting, our Winter Potluck and Gear Swap and our annual cookouts (all over 20 people), the Toys for Kids tent with 22 and our Christmas party with 34 members. From our new member Matt Regnier on his MSF course that MA2 helped sponsor...

The MSF riders course is a great program. I would recommend it for any rider at any skill level. The book work and instructional video's are very informative. Even if you are a seasoned rider there is lots of reminders that most of us have forgotten. If you're a new rider there is a bunch of information that will make you ride more confidently and safely.



The MSF road course is a great beginning for a new rider or a great way for seasoned riders to test their skills. The instructor is very patient with new riders and has much information.

The road course persist of a variety of different skills. One of the biggest skills they enforce is clutch control, stopping and accelerating. When you get farther along in the day they start incorporating counter leaning. Then they get farther into left hand and right hand turns. One of the most difficult drills in my opinion was the box drill. The box drill consist of making a tight left hand and right hand turn. It makes you better understand slow speed maneuvers.

The final day incorporates all of the online classes and what you learned during the road course. You are practicing to take the road test in small chunks. Then in the final part of the day you start the road test. The road test becomes less intimidating because all of the things you have ben practicing is the road test.

I would personally recommend all new riders should take this class. It makes you slow down and learn the essentials in riding a motorcycle. If you know how to use a clutch and have a basic understanding of motorcycles this course is for you.

Where might our Hooky Rides lead in 2025

2024 Chapter Mileage

2024 started out as a wet season for riding and when we hit August the drought set in with little rain, right through November! Even if you did not get a lot of miles in the first months of the riding season, the opportunity to ride (and keep dry) definitely kicked up your odds for the second half of 2024's season!

And as we always say, every mile ridden is a bonus for our peace of mind!



On our original 2024 schedule there were 39 events, and at the end of the year we had 31 official rides and events that took place, plus and additional 8 "Hooky" rides.

We had members at a number of regional rallies and at the International convention in Germany! Our picture board showed a lot of smiles in the 90 pictures that greeted us at the Christmas party.

We have been keeping track of Chapter Member mileage for 17 years now, and our total of documented miles for those years is 2,346,860 with the addition of this year's 100,969 miles.

With over 2.3 million miles (collectively) in those years, our yearly average is over 138,000 miles. A bit less than average this year, but still a lot of miles our tires have rolled!

And since the International Convention is in Australia next year, a Canadian trip could keep you international if you are not headed down under!




Todd McLain from NC13 is a master wood craftsman and made a new display case for the RKMC Founder and Board members' commemorative coins.



Winter tips for coping when not riding (Excerpts from Revzilla on-line)

As winter's dreary gray-brown palette dominates the landscape outside my garage window, I take comfort in the warm orange glow of the space heater angled between my bike and workbench. I do have to "winterize myself," finding ways to cope with this dramatic reduction in riding frequency. Regardless of



climactic issues, virtually every motorcyclist must contend with the occasional riding hiatus, and we need to keep our motorcycling selves charged, just as we protect our batteries from the consequences of disuse while the bikes they inhabit sit inert.

Here are some ways we can winterize ourselves in these long, dark days:

<u>Garage time</u>. Garage time is a solution cherished by those of us who love spinning wrenches. Winter offers a great opportunity to install aftermarket parts, perform maintenance and repairs, or simply clean, polish, and adjust every little bit on our bikes to absolute perfection.

<u>Planning future rides</u>. The fun of riding isn't confined to the time we spend with wheels turning. When we plan an adventure (even a tiny one) many weeks in the future, we enhance the entire interim. Collecting gear, prepping our bikes, discussing routes with riding buddies, and imagining the upcoming event all extend its pleasures all the way back to the present.

<u>Learning</u>. While having a special goal in mind usually improves our focus and motivation, we can also bolster our mental and physical readiness for riding in general during forced downtime. Sitting in front of the fireplace with a warming beverage, reading books and articles or watching videos devoted to skill development will keep our awareness of technique fresh and sharp.

<u>Maintenance is not just for motorcycles</u>. We tend to get fatter, stiffer and weaker during the winter months, retreating deeply into our caves to wait out the cold passively, hibernation-style. Without regular and substantive fitness-related activity, we'll climb back into our saddles in the spring in considerably worse shape than the last time we rode, increasing the dangerous discrepancy between our pent-up enthusiasm and lagging physical condition.

<u>Entertainment for motorcyclists in forced hibernation</u>. Motorcycle-oriented entertainment provides vicarious thrills and discoveries. Watching races, riding travelogues, and historical documentaries helps pass the time as winter, or any other riding interruption, drags on.

Finally, if you're like me, you may also find some satisfaction just sitting in a warm garage, silently admiring the aesthetics and engineering of a beloved machine you can do nothing else with at the moment. My space heater isn't the only thing glowing on this dim winter afternoon.

Know Your Riding Risk Factors — from Road Runner magazine on-line

There are some similarities between the causes of plane crashes and the reasons for motorcycle accidents: it's often a combination of factors, or risks, that cause incidents in both cases. And in both, the fundamental cause can usually be traced back to "human error." Just as in doing a preflight check before flying your own airplane, a motorcyclist should take stock of his or her risk factors before their ride. Unlike the airline industry, which has many rules, regulations, and certifications in place to help prevent accidents, the motorcycle rider is pretty much on their own.

[You should be thinking of the] four fundamental categories of rider risk and how they can overlap to create even higher levels of accident risk to riders.

The Four Rs For Evaluating Motorcycle Riding Risk are Rider, Ride, Route, and Riding Environment.

You, The Rider

The question here is, are you physically and mentally prepared to ride safely? Here are some of the most important considerations:

Physically Fit? Physical impairments, like injuries or lack of sleep, will compromise alertness and safety.

Emotionally Fit? Riders should not be preoccupied with emotional distractions.

Chemically Unimpaired? It goes without saying that motorcycle riding and consumption of controlled substances is often a lethal combination. I cringe when I see a bunch of motorcycles parked outside of a bar. An ambulance should be onsite, like at racetracks, to pick up the pieces!

Wearing Proper Gear? Because the risks of motorcycling can be mitigated—but not eliminated—it's imperative that riders wear all their protective gear all the time. That includes a full-face helmet, proper boots and gloves, and riding jackets and pants with armor.

Have the Right Attitude? Riders

should display a proper attitude, enjoying the ride, but doing so responsibly. Wheelies, stoppies, riding with legs draped over the handlebars, excessive speed, or other high-risk behaviors, inevitably, will lead (sooner or later) to a rider going down and endangering themself and others.

Your Ride

Bike Mechanically Fit? Like the pilot who does a walk around of a plane before takeoff, riders should make sure their bike is ready to ride: properly inflated tires, turn signals and brake lights working, no obvious mechanical issues, etc.

Familiar Bike? When I ride an unfamiliar bike, it usually takes me at least 30 minutes of riding before I feel "dialed in" and fully in control of the new motorcycle. It's important to take it easy and not push any limits until your confidence level is at 100 percent.

Visible to Others? Are you riding a blacked-out bike (without reflectors or auxiliary lights) in black leathers, wearing a graphite color helmet at night? One of the leading causes of accidents is other motorists not seeing the motorcyclist. Be visible!

Hauling Cargo? If you will be hauling human or other cargo, the bike will handle differently: directional changes will be slower, braking distances will increase, and acceleration will be degraded. A slower responding bike requires adjustments to speed, following distances, and other similar riding considerations.

Your Route

Wearing Proper Gear? Because the sof motorcycling can be gated—but not eliminated—it's

Road Conditions/Hazards? Bad pavement, tar snakes, pot holes, animals, poorly maintained railroad crossings, road debris, and plastic strips used to denote cross walks can all increase the risk of a crash. Speed and caution should be adjusted accordingly when these are present.

Level of Difficulty? If you've just gotten your motorcycle endorsement, riding technically demanding roads with steep elevation changes, switchbacks, and hairpin curves should be avoided until your skill level progresses to meet such demands. The Tail of the Dragon will still be there when you're ready for it.

Services Available? Riding in remote areas, where gas stations are few and far between and emergency medical service is not readily available, requires more planning and riding caution.

Your Riding Environment

Time of Day? Riding into the sun, either in early morning or late evening, can severely limit a rider's ability to see where he or she is going and avoid hazards. I usually try not to ride at night, because my ability to see and be seen is greatly compromised. It's also at these times of day that deer and certain other members of the animal kingdom are most active, further increasing risk.

Weather? Fog, rain, snow, freezing temperatures, extreme heat, thunderstorms, and other types of severe weather pose a much greater threat to a motorcyclist's ability to avoid hazards and be visible to other motorists, not to mention the danger of being injured or killed by the severe weather itself.

Traffic Congestion? With drivers talking on cell phones, texting, trying to read while driving, and the myriad of other distractions available in the 21st century, the heightened exposure of riding in heavy traffic is pretty obvious. Because many of those other drivers may not be alert to your presence, riders have to be extra alert to the rapid-fire succession of threats developing around them.

If you start combining some of these hazards (and I'm sure you can add to the list), as illustrated by the areas of overlap in the Venn diagram, then it's apparent that your risk profile can increase dramatically. Riders should continuously assess their riding perils, both before and during the ride, so they can mitigate them. Sometimes, when the threat level is just too high, the best mitigation may be to just not ride.

WHO, WHO, WHO... WHO ARE YOU?

He is also a member of the Hatfield Fire department as a per-diem Firefighter/Paramedic and holds the rank of Lieutenant, there.

Jeff joined the Red Knights in 2014 and has served as both the chapter Road Captain and as President of (as he says), our amazing chapter.

As most of you know, Jeff enjoys traveling via twowheels and has found great joy in long distance endurance riding holding several certifications with the Iron Butt Association.

Jeff tells us that he cannot wait to hear from all of you and learn more about the members of this chapter.

John has a musical background as well, and people may be surprised to learn that he plays the violin and guitar!



Red Knights MA-2 Honor Guard Procedural and Ceremonial Protocol

Scope:

This protocol provides the procedural and ceremonial policy for the Red Knights MA-2 Chapter Honor Guard.

It shall be carried out in full compliance with family wishes, and information provided within the MA-2 Family Assistance Form¹.

Procedural:

- Upon notification² of a member's passing, a Family Liaison will be assigned by the chapter President or designee. Unless special circumstances dictate differently, this liaison will come from within the Executive Board. This liaison will work with the family to guide the process through completion.
- The Family Liaison shall notify the chosen funeral director, of the family request for participation of the MA-2 Honor Guard. This notification shall also include any additional requests for representation such as The Patriot Guard, or others.
- Members of the MA-2 Chapter Honor Guard shall be volunteers from within the chapter membership. The Honor Guard will be recruited and established as soon as the Honor Guard is formally created by the chapter. This does not preclude an RK member that has a special relationship with the deceased member, and who is not a member of the Honor Guard, from volunteering.
- The generally accepted number of roster members in the Honor Guard is to be a minimum of 6, to ensure coverage as may be necessary.
- The Executive Board shall appoint the chapter Vice President or designee as Officer of the Guard (OOG). The appointed person shall lead the Honor Guard at all events in which the Honor Guard has participation. The OOG shall also be responsible for recruitment, orientation, and maintaining proper levels of staffing as well as any equipment, regalia and documentation.
- The OOG shall coordinate with the Family Liaison to ensure the family's wishes are met.

¹ A copy of the Family Assistance form is included with this document. The Family Assistance form is a voluntary means to assist a member or their family in planning final arrangements.

² If an Executive Board member receives notification of a chapter member's death, that officer shall contact the Chapter President. The chapter president (or designee) will notify the chapter members, when appropriate, of the member's passing. The chapter president (or designee) is responsible for contacting the Red Knights International through their notification protocol on the passing of a member. Whenever possible, the members of MA-2 will be notified, and the notification posted via chapter social media, prior to the public announcement to be made by the Red Knights International.

Ceremonial:

cooperation.

- For viewing, there shall be an Honor Guard member at the head and foot of the deceased member. Shifts are recommended to formally change every 15 minutes. However, a longer period can be adapted as the situation dictates, but not to exceed 30 minutes.
- The formal placement and change of the Honor Guard shall be conducted and led by the
 Officer of the Guard. Honor Guard members shall salute each other prior to and after posting.
 Note: There may be occasions where the Honor Guard duties will be shared with
 additional agencies. In those cases, the Officer of the Guard shall ensure the details and
 - O At the funeral parlor, the order of viewing shall be as follows:
 - 1. MA-2 Executive Board, followed by the MA-2 membership.
 - 2. Other MA Red Knight chapters.
 - 3. Red Knight International members.
 - 4. Other visiting (RKMC) guests.
- In the event the Honor Guard is requested to a church for a funeral service, two (2) Guards will post outside the main entry door before and after the service. Special family requests may alter this part of the protocol.
- If the Honor Guard is requested for interment, it shall be under the direction of the funeral director in coordination with the Officer of the Guard.
- Colors shall include the United States Flag and the Red Knights Chapter Flag, with the US Flag always at the head of the casket (on the left of the audience).
- Dress of the day for the Honor Guard shall include:
 - Red Knights Red Vest
 - White gloves
 - Badge covers
 - Arm bands
 - Gold shoulder braiding
 - Long Sleeve white shirt and black tie
 - Black pants
 - Black shoes
 - Honor Guard pin
- The Officer of the Guard shall be responsible for the storage and availability of uniform supplies of the honor guard, as described above. This storage shall also include a file that contains any completed Family Assistance Forms that have been shared with the Executive Board by members and their families, so that they may be easily retrieved when necessary.
